





# Our Vision:

The very best that British international education offers. A thriving school community which nurtures, inspires and empowers everyone to be the very best they can be.

Children move through several stages of their education in specific school environments suitable to their age and stage of learning. There are three School sections:







### Our Home

The British School of Amsterdam was founded in 1978 by three expat families with the idea that their children should not fall behind the British school system whilst working overseas. Over time the School grew and by the turn of the Millennium, a full Primary and Senior School was established. Now, over 40 years later the School caters to children from 3 to 18 years old.

At The British School, we believe that children should be ambitious and reach for their dreams, and we actively strive to ignite their curiosities, encourage them to be relentlessly optimistic and to develop a love of learning. Success is not only measured by academic achievement, but how your child grows in other important ways, such as through life skills and other talents in the arts, sports and through leadership activities.

Each School section is planned and run with a curriculum tailored to the needs of children at these different stages in their social, emotional and academic development. Children receive a well-rounded education, equipping them with all the skills needed for the next stage in their learning journey. We have close to 200 employees; over 80 are teachers with a high proportion who have experience in the UK. Our staff body are truly talented and unlike many international schools, a significant number of our teachers have been with us for a long time, in fact a combined total of 550 years' experience.

The School is located in Amsterdam Oud-Zuid near several green spaces. The School is easily accessible for families commuting from different parts of the city and surrounding areas. Within the School building, each section has their own wing to maintain the character of that School and is specially designed so that it is suitable for the ages of the children.

The School is a re-engineered, monumental building with some of the finest educational facilities in the city. There is a magnificent sports hall, beautiful playgrounds, a large theatre, assembly halls and fully equipped science laboratories and music rooms. Classrooms are light and airy and many original features were maintained so there is a wonderful mix of old and new.

### Pupil Body

The whole School roll is currently over 1,100 pupils. We are a truly international school with over 46 different native languages and over 90 different cultures. Our pupils speak many languages at home that are additional to their academic curriculum.

### Early Years School

The Early Years School is made up of Nursery, Reception and Year I for children aged 3-6. There are four Nursery classes, with one Teacher and three Nursery Officers for each class. A maximum of 25 children attend each session. There are four Reception and Year I classes with a maximum class size of 24. There is a Teacher and a Nursery Officer/Teaching Assistant in each class. Each teaching room has a SmartBoard and access to a set of iPads.

The staff strive to provide an inspiring, stimulating and exciting environment where everyone feels valued, safe and well cared for. We want children to have fun and enjoy success in all aspects of their education and this is helped with all classrooms leading directly onto the playground. We value the partnership between home and school and encourage parents to also play an active part in their child's education.

The children follow the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Curriculum for England which sets the standards that all providers for the Early Years must meet to ensure that children learn and develop well and are kept healthy and safe. Teaching and learning ensures the children's School readiness and gives children the broad range of knowledge and skills that provide the right foundation for good future progress through School and life. As part of the curriculum the following areas are covered; Literacy, Mathematics, Understanding the World and Expressive Arts and Design.

In the EYFS, there are prime areas of learning: communication and language, physical development and personal, social and emotional development. Dynamic and child-led teaching activities engage children across the Early Years, and the children also experience Forest School and a variety of enrichment activities including music, FitNut, sports and games, and ballet (optional).

The children in Year I follow the National Curriculum used in England which provides pupils with an introduction to the essential knowledge they need to be educated citizens. The curriculum helps provide an appreciation of human creativity and achievement. The national curriculum is just one element in the education of every child. There is time and space in the School day and in each week, term and year to range beyond the curriculum specifications. The curriculum provides an outline of core knowledge around which teachers can develop exciting and stimulating lessons to promote the development of pupils' knowledge, understanding and skills as part of the wider School curriculum.

English and Dutch are taught as additional languages by specialist teachers. Native Dutch is taught to children who speak Dutch in the home. Children who are new to English receive additional support from our English as an Additional Language (EAL) Teachers, who work with small groups of children either as a withdrawn group or in class. In addition children have specialist music lessons.

#### Junior School

The Junior School is made up of Years 2 to 6 for children aged 6-11. There are four classes across each year and a maximum class size of 24. In Year 2 there is a Teacher and Teaching Assistant in each class. From Year 3 onwards, each class has a Teacher and Teaching Assistants that support across the Year Group.

Children learn to work in an atmosphere of cooperation and mutual respect and can enjoy an extensive programme of extracurricular activities and there are dedicated music rooms for private music tuition.

A well-balanced timetable ensures the delivery of all subjects over a weekly period. The day runs from 8.45 to 3.25 (for Years 2 and 3) or 3.30 (for Years 4 to 6). English and Mathematics are recognised as core subjects and taught daily. There are key objectives that are taught through the lessons and each lesson is differentiated to include all the different levels of learning ability within a class. Children who are new to English receive additional support from our English as an Additional Language (EAL) Teachers, who work with small groups of children either as a withdrawn group or in class. All children work towards learning targets which are set by the teachers each term. Curriculum and Learning Support Teachers also complement activities in each year group. Children access a variety of support and extension groups each week.

A topic based approach to the curriculum is made with an emphasis on cross curricular links. Science, History, Geography, Art, Design & Technology and Computing are all taught through a topic based approach in short or long units and we aim to make our curriculum exciting, relevant and appropriately challenging.

Each year group takes part in an annual production, and there is a rich variety of music in the school, with 12 private music teachers offering one to one tuition, three choirs and a range of performance opportunities. Swimming in the Junior School is a half year programme for Year 3 upwards and all children attend a residential trip at the end of the year.

Personal, Health and Social Education (PHSE) is taught through assembly themes and through Jigsaw lessons in class. Jigsaw is a comprehensive, whole-school approach to promoting the social and emotional skills that underpin effective learning, positive behaviour, and the emotional health and well-being of all who learn and work in schools.

All Junior children have two Physical Education (PE) lessons per week, one which is led by a specialist teacher.

Children access curriculum music lessons led by our music teachers, and in addition, the children have a specific Art Skills lesson each week taught by a specialist teacher.

In the Junior School there are also opportunities to be part of the School Council and Eco Squad, and in Year 6 to become School Prefects. These roles develop the children's sense of responsibility and citizenship skills.

#### Assessing progress in the Early Years and Junior School

In the Early Years, continuous assessment of how each child is developing is matched to their progress against the Early Learning Goals, using a software platform called EvidenceMe as a base for our evidence.

From Year I, and for each subsequent year, children are assessed at regular points through the year using the learning objectives from the National Curriculum used in England and the end of year expectations for each year group. We also look at children's attitudes and capabilities in a wider context to understand how each child is progressing in their social as well as academic development. These objectives are used to report progress mid-way and at the end of each year, and support and extension programmes are put in place to ensure every child's needs are targeted.

We use Standard Attainment Tests (SATs) to test children formally at the end of Year 2 and Year 6 and these tests are externally marked at the end of Key Stage 2 (end of Year 6). We get very good results from our pupils, typically performing well above national averages.



### Senior School

The Senior School is made up of Years 7 to 13 for children aged between 11-18.

The School offers a stimulating and challenging environment. In Years 7 to 9, the maximum class size is 22. The pupils benefit from smaller teaching groups in Years 10 and 11 and in our Sixth Form (Years 12 and 13). Classrooms are used by a range of subjects, alongside specialist rooms equipped for Science, IT and Computing, Music, Drama and Art.

The Senior School timetable, split over a two week period, enables a broad and balanced curriculum. The day runs from 8.40 to 3.40. Our extracurricular activities run before, during and after school and offer our pupils an enriching provision in, amongst others, the areas of technology, sport, and the arts.

#### In the Senior School we aim:

- To nurture and inspire all pupils in our inclusive, diverse community, encouraging and fostering tolerance and respect for all.
- To empower pupils to take risks in their learning and support them in their educational journey, within and beyond the curriculum, to unlock their full and unique potential.
- To develop creative, independent and innovative learners.


### Curriculum

In the Senior School Years 7 to 9 follow the Key Stage 3 Curriculum.Years 10 and 11 study a combination of IGCSEs and GCSEs and the Sixth Form (Years 12 and 13) follows the A Level programme.



#### Key Stage 3 (Years 7, 8 and 9)

At The British School up to the end of Key Stage 3 (age 14), all pupils follow the same core curriculum. Attainment and effort grades are reported three times per academic year. In Years 7, 8 and 9 (Key Stage 3) attainment is measured in alignment with end of year expectations.



#### Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11)

In Years 10 and 11 (Key Stage 4) pupils take IGCSE (International General Certificate of Education) or GCSE (General Certificate of Education) courses, externally examined at the end of the two years.



# School Life

### Uniform

Uniforms can be purchased from our online uniform shop to be collected from the School. For more information and to order, visit bsauniformshop.nl.

### Lunch

The School uses Markies Catering to provide lunch options. Markies provide fresh lunch options and encourages pupils to make healthy choices in terms of food and drink by showing that responsible food is tasty. They offer different options, such as a termly subscription or ordering from an assortment menu on a daily basis with notice given depending on whether hot food or a packed lunch is selected. Ordering is done through a direct, online ordering system and costs range from €3.25 to €5.75 a day.

### Private Music Tuition

The School is fortunate to have a variety of experienced Peripatetic Music teachers, who come into school to give private individual music lessons on different instruments. Lessons are offered on Violin, Cello, Harp, Guitar, Recorder, Flute, Clarinet/Saxophone, Brass, Voice, Piano and Drums. These music teachers come under the collective title of the Young Musicians of The British School of Amsterdam (YMBSA) and focus on meeting our pupil's musical needs first. They are experienced and intuitive; our pupils become proud and confident musicians.

The YMBSA have their own system for applying and paying for lessons, separate from school fees. More details can be found in the YMBSA Conditions.

#### Music Exams

Exams are used as a motivation tool to encourage practice and to give the pupils individual goals and a great sense of achievement.

• The ABRSM board and the Trinity College of Music (UK) have syllabi ranging from the beginner's level up to grade 8. Each exam encourages the 'all round' musician by incorporating performance pieces and technical tests including scales, sight-reading and aural tests.

• The AB exams are held digitally and twice a year in The Netherlands with exam centres in Amstelveen and Voorschoten (near the Hague).

Pupils are provided with opportunities to perform throughout the year in concerts, recitals, assemblies, and class lessons, both as soloists and members of ensembles.

## After School Care Majest

The School works with Majest Global to provide reliable, good quality after school care for children. Experienced leaders offer a wide range of activities, from cooking to playing sports, from music to group activities. The children are free to decide if they wish to participate, they may sometimes prefer some quiet time and want to read a book, listen to music or do some homework. Children are given the space to choose. Day trips are organised during School holidays.

Majest provides after school care exclusively to The British School children between the ages of 3 to 12 years. The facility is open every day after School from 3.10 to 6.30 and during School holidays from 8.00 to 6.30.

### Parents' Organisation

At The British School, we care very much about the whole School community and helping where possible to support families settle in. Our Parents' Organisation are key to doing this well. ### Learning Support


The fee is €40,420 per year for **full time support** or allocations are made based on the level of support needed.


